## **BACKGROUND**

The SULU programme was originally commissioned by the NHS London Leadership Academy back in 2017. It attracted an extraordinary amount of interest by offering insight into speaking in healthcare settings — and providing the opportunity for participants to explore their experiences in this regard and to get guidance on how best to give voice to their thoughts and ideas.

We are delighted to be able to offer people the opportunity to experience SULU once again – and we are providing it primarily to people in the NHS who take on the role of Freedom to Speak Up Guardians.

## **DETAILS OF THE SESSION**

The workshop is an interactive opportunity to reflect on speaking up corporate life. It is built on a body a research and theorising that encompasses power in the workplace, voice and silence in organisations, and activism at work.

Additionally, it provides a fantastic chance to explore in practice the embodiment of voice, so as to offer practical insights into how we can speak in order to be heard.



## SPEAK UP, LISTEN UP – VOICE AND THE RELATIONAL IN THE HEALTH CARE WORKPLACE



Once the FTSU Guardian for a particular NHS organisation registers for the workshop, the SULU team will provide a one-hour online introduction to the topic for the executive and non-executive directors of that agency.

The FTSU Guardian attendees are invited ahead of the workshop to explore the question, "What are you hearing?"

Similarly, the leaders from the masterclass are invited to respond to the question, "What are your issues?"

The workshop offers the opportunity for an informed interactive exploration of actual issues of concern for the participant group

Using the expertise of one of the SULU team, we are able to offer follow up workshops on the embodied voice and how best to think about speaking up.

We can also provide coaching support to participants from the workshop in terms of carrying the learning properly into practice – and sharing it with others in the organisation.

We will provide a post-event reflection for the organisation in light of the SULU team's experience of the sessions.
